- The opening crawl was inspired by the Flash Gordon serials

 Lucas loved as a kid, instantly pulling viewers into the story and becoming one of the most iconic openings in cinema.


The production used several mechanical sharks that constantly malfunctioned in saltwater, leading Spielberg to show the shark less — a choice that ultimately made the film scarier.

2 Roy Scheider improvised the iconic line, "You're gonna need a bigger boat," and Spielberg kept it in, turning it into one of the most quoted movie lines ever.

The mechanical shark was nicknamed "Bruce" after Spielberg's lawyer, becoming an on-set joke and later inspiring references in other films like Finding Nemo.

Jaws was the first movie to earn over \$100 million at the box office, reshaping Hollywood marketing and creating the "summer blockbuster."

The production was chaotic with technical failures, bad weather, and major delays, and Spielberg almost quit — yet the film went on to define his career and transform suspense filmmaking.








E.T. THE EXTRA-TERRESTRIAL

- The story for E.T. was inspired by Steven Spielberg's childhood. After his parents divorced, he imagined an invisible alien friend for comfort a seed that grew into one of cinema's most heartfelt films.
- 2 E.T.'s voice came from a mix of unusual sounds. Sound designer Ben Burtt blended animal noises like raccoons and sea otters with the raspy voice of an elderly heavy smoker to create the alien's distinct tone.
- Spielberg filmed the movie in chronological order, a rare choice for big productions. It helped the child actors, especially Henry Thomas, form real emotional bonds with E.T., making the final scene especially authentic.
- E.T.'s glowing finger was made using a small light bulb inside a rubber glove. This simple practical effect became one of the film's most iconic symbols of healing and connection.
- When released, E.T. became a worldwide hit, even surpassing Star Wars as the highest-grossing film ever until Jurassic Park (also by Spielberg) took the title in 1993 further cementing his status as a master storyteller.

- 3 Bill Murray improvised many of his lines, shaping Peter Venkman's sarcastic personality and giving the film much of its distinctive comedic tone.
- 4 Slimer was inspired by comedian John Belushi, with Dan Aykroyd describing the green ghost as the "spirit of Belushi" after his passing.
- Ray Parker Jr.'s Ghostbusters theme song became a worldwide hit, topping the Billboard charts and becoming one of the most recognizable movie themes ever.

JURASSIC PARK

TRIVIA

- The massive T-Rex animatronic, which stood 20 feet tall and weighed over 12,000 pounds, often malfunctioned during rain sequences. The movements became so unpredictable that the crew jokingly called it "the diva." Many actors' terrified reactions in the film were completely genuine.
- The dinosaurs' sounds were created by mixing recordings of animals like elephants, lions, tigers, and even penguins, giving each species a unique roar or hiss.
- Michael Crichton sold the rights to his unfinished novel for \$1.5 million, and Spielberg began developing the film before the book was published. Crichton also co-wrote the script.
- Jurassic Park was the first film to use DTS digital surround sound, forever changing the standard for cinematic audio experiences. The immersive sound design was key to its realism.
- Jeff Goldblum's famous line, "Life finds a way," was partly improvised. The quote became a defining phrase not only for his character but for the entire franchise, symbolizing the unpredictability of evolution and nature.



TRIVIA

- The Titanic set featured a nearly full-scale replica of the ship's exterior, built in Mexico and carefully engineered to flood for the sinking scenes. Filming those sequences took months and required precise choreography from hundreds of cast and crew.
- **2** Kate Winslet performed many of her own stunts, often spending hours submerged in icy water. She refused to use a stunt double for key moments to keep her performance authentic.
- 3 Director James Cameron personally made 12 dives to the real Titanic wreck, capturing actual underwater footage that appears in the film. His firsthand experience helped shape the movie's realism and emotional depth.
- The film's massive \$200 million budget made it the most expensive movie ever produced at the time—ironically costing more than the real Titanic did to build in 1912 when adjusted for inflation.
- 5 Leonardo DiCaprio improvised the now-iconic line "I'm the king of the world!" during filming. The unscripted moment perfectly captured Jack's joyful spirit and became one of the most famous movie quotes of all time.

The Chamber of Secrets set was one of the largest in the series, featuring giant snake statues, sculpted details, and a hydraulic serpentine door.

The flying car was a real 1962 Ford Anglia, with several versions made for stunts—including one that was stolen from the studio lot.

The Basilisk used both practical and digital effects, including a detailed 30-foot animatronic head crafted for close-up shots.

Emma Watson wrote a 16-page essay on Hermione for the film, while Daniel Radcliffe wrote one





2 Emma Stone insisted on performing many of her own stunts throughout the film, wanting Gwen Stacy's courage, resilience, and quick-thinking nature to feel authentic. Her commitment helped give the character a grounded realism that audiences immediately connected with.

To create the film's immersive web-swinging sequences, the crew used over 100 stunt wires, practical rigs, and carefully mapped choreography. These techniques were designed to capture the true physics of momentum and weight, giving Spider-Man's movements a believable athletic flow.

During his audition, Andrew Garfield delivered such a raw and heartfelt reading of Uncle Ben's death scene that it reportedly moved the casting team to tears. His performance demonstrated a deep understanding of Peter Parker's emotional core and ultimately secured him the role.

The movie's score, composed by James Horner—also known for his work on Titanic—infused the film with both epic energy and heartfelt emotion, elevating the film's tone beyond a typical superhero blockbuster.


